School Year 2017-2018

The Williamsburg Y Head Start located at 64 Division Avenue Brooklyn, New York 11249 is a comprehensive family focused and federally funded child development program, which has been in existence for over forty years. It is a unique program because it encourages creative program designs, including collaboration with community agencies, to meet the different needs of children and their families. As an all inclusive and comprehensive program the 195 Head Start children receive a variety of learning experiences which foster intellectual, physical, social, and emotional growth. The 2017-2018 school year was the last year in our five year grant cycle. Our program was awarded a new, noncompetitive five year grant because no areas of non-compliance were found during the Federal Review cycle.

Education

The Y.M. & Y.W.H.A. of Williamsburg Head Start program continues to use the unit-based Creative Curriculum that includes a variety of writing, math, music, science, story time, arts and crafts, indoor/outdoor activities, and free play for the three year old classrooms. The Pre-K for All classes use the research-based Interdisciplinary Units of Study which were created by the Division of Early Childhood Education in collaboration with researchers. This curriculum supports student learning in all domains using developmentally appropriate practices. The instruction is focused on developing the foundational knowledge and skills outlined in the New York State Prekindergarten Foundation standards and OHS Early Learning Framework. In addition, our program offers a variety of enrichment programs, including HOSH Yoga, Education in Dance, Creativity Soccer Pro and Fitness is Fun. All activities were designed to stimulate children's physical, intellectual, social and emotional growth in a loving and comfortable environment. In addition, to enhance STEM knowledge and skills, our program

started working on an Outdoor Science Laboratory, which will be completed in time for the 2018-2019 school year. Hands on experiences and experimentation will allow children to explore math and science concepts, and develop their analytic, classification and prediction skills.

In order to build upon the strengths of staff members, the Y.M. & Y.W.H.A. of Williamsburg Head Start provides opportunities for professional development that assist staff members in improving the quality of services and in meeting their professional goals. In-service training is provided throughout the school year by the Education Directors, consultants and other content area specialists. This year, teachers were also able to attend two training conferences, Best Practices for Teaching Pre-K and K hosted by BOCES and the Young Child Expo & Conference hosted by Los Ninos. Feedback from both Conferences was very positive and teachers were able to attend workshops on a variety of topics including challenging behaviors, special needs and peer mentoring.

Special Education

- 100% of the children enrolled in the program were screened within 45 days of entry.
- 40 Children (20%) had an IEP indicating that they qualified to receive special education services.
- 18 children out of 40 (9%) entered the program year with an IEP.
- 22 children of the 40 (11%) were referred to CPSE and qualified for special education services during the school year.

FISCAL

The annual report has been prepared to comply with requirements of the Head Start Reauthorization Act of 2008. This Head Start Act Section 644(a)(2)(A)-(H) states:

This Head Start agency makes available to the public a report published at least once in each fiscal year that discloses the following information from the most recently concluded fiscal year.

- (A) The total amount of public and private funds received and the amount from each source.
- (B) An explanation of budgetary expenditures and proposed budget for the fiscal year.

The agency's 2017/2018 fiscal audit was conducted by a Certified Public Accountant, Barry Popick, to ensure that the YM & YWHA of Williamsburg, Inc. Head Start Program procedures met compliance standards. The audit will include any material findings and state that the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the YM & YWHA of Williamsburg, Inc.

Head Start Program as of January 31, 2018 and the changes in the net assets and its cash flows for the year ending January 31, 2018 will be in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. A complete copy of the audit and its components will be available upon request (45CFR Part 5).

PUBLIC AND PRIVATE FUNDS RECEIVED:

The YM & YWHA of Williamsburg, Inc., Head Start Program is federally funded through the Administration for Children and Families (ACF), and other public and private funding that constitutes the required non-federal share (cash and in-kind). The YM & YWHA of Williamsburg, Inc., Head Start Program received the following funds to operate the Head Start, Universal Pre-kindergarten and CACFP programs.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture provided \$185,923 of reimbursements for daily breakfast, lunch and snacks, through the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) administered by the New York State Department of Health.

BUDGETARY EXPENSES:

The accompanying schedule enumerates the personnel and program expenditures necessary to staff the YM & YWHA of Williamsburg, Inc., Head Start Program. In all, the YM & YWHA of Williamsburg, Inc., Head Start Program expended \$2,517,552 of federal funds in administering the Head Start program, a percentage (82%) of which supports the personnel and fringe expenses required to staff the center. The total program budget was \$3,146,940.

NON-FEDERAL SHARE:

The non-federal share/in-kind match requirement is obtained annually through donated services that are generated by parents and community organizations and in-kind rent. The contract requirements are a non-federal match of \$629,388. The total amount recorded was \$1,441,535. This program exceeded the non-federal share/inkind match by \$812,147.

This agency's allocation of Head Start administrative expenses (which is 10.26% falls within the 15% administrative cap) and programmatic expenditures are as follows:



Additional Curricula 2017-2018

Education in Dance

This program combines basic dance skills, creative movements, theatre skills for self- esteem, an exploration of quality music and visual art forms, nutrition and focus techniques to introduce and immerse children in the arts.

Fitness is Fun

Children participated in age appropriate physical actives led by a personal trainer to create a classroom environment rich in physical activity, the exploration of movement, imagination and neuromuscular development. The sessions reinforced the academic efforts of the teaching staff with related movement activities to make exercise a regular part of our children's days.



Creativity Pro Soccer

Creativity Pro Soccer Program which develops fun, safe and developmentally appropriate activities for children teach children game of soccer. Each class is delivered by highly enthusiastic and skillful soccer coaches with low child-to-coach ratios.

Hosh Yoga

The yoga activities are developmentally appropriate for children to relax and rejuvenate though gentle movements, deep relaxation, controlled breathing and guided meditation.

Program Special Events 2017-2018

Pumpkin Patch

We transformed our playground into a Pumpkin Patch for the children on October 27, 2017. The children preformed fall themed songs for their parents. Louie Miranda conducted activities and songs for each group that were age appropriate and fun. Each child was able to choose a miniature pumpkin to take home. The children were excited and participated with enthusiasm.

Pajama Day

Our center received a donation from the Pajama Program. Each child received a pair of pajamas and a book. To celebrate we held a pajama day on November 17, 2017. The Policy Council also dressed up in pajamas and read "bedtime stories" to the children.



Thanksgiving Luncheon

The Annual Thanksgiving Luncheon was held on November 21, 2017. Parents were invited to bring in dishes from their cultures as well as traditional Thanksgiving foods. After the luncheon, parents joined the children in the classrooms for dessert.

Kindergarten Fair

Our annual school fair was held on December 5, 2017. Principals from neighboring public and charter schools were invited to inform parents about their school's unique programs. Parents had the opportunity to ask questions and gather information to make decisions regarding the appropriate school setting for their children.

Representatives from the Brooklyn Borough President's office attended and presented our Executive Director, Ruth Neale, with a Citation for her years of service to our community.





Winter Festival

Winter Festival was held on December 20, 2017. The children did a wonderful job performing winter themed songs and dances for their families. Parents and children had a lot of fun.

On December 21, 2017 the Policy Council put on a Winter Activity for the children. One of the parents dressed up as Frosty the Snowman and the children were able to go through a gingerbread house obstacle course. Each child received a holiday gift at the end of the activity.

Friendship Day

The parents from the Policy Council prepared activities for Friendship day on February 14, 2018. The parents visited each classroom to read a story about friendship and each child received a yummy snack.

<u>Fathers Initiative Week of April 16, 2018</u>

Countless fathers and other family members participated in different classroom activities throughout the week. In some classrooms, fathers joined their children for meal time, story time, work time, and music and movement activities while in other classrooms they participated in special events or shared their talents and/or hobbies. Parents and children enjoyed this event. The most positive aspect was that although it



was Father's Initiative, all family members were welcomed to be involved.

Open House

There was a large turnout for our Open House which was held on April 18, 2018. Current families as well as families on our waiting list joined us for a short presentation and a tour of the school. The parents had an opportunity to observe and/or participate in many exciting activities that take place in the classroom. The feedback from the parents was very positive and they look forward to joining our program next year.



Multicultural Month

May was a multicultural month in our school. During this month the children learned about the cultures of different countries. On May 30th we celebrated Multicultural Day. Each classroom's show demonstrated the culture of the different countries through songs, dance and/or story telling. The activities prepared showed teachers creativity and dedication. Our Multicultural Day which concluded with a parade in the neighborhood was fun and engaging for the children and the parents.

<u>Fire Department Visit</u>

A firefighter from the FDNY visited our program on May 22, 2018. The firefighter spoke to the children about fire safety and gave each child a coloring book and Junior Firefighter certificate. The children were very enthusiastic and asked many questions.

<u>Transition to Kindergarten</u>

A goal of the program is to move children to kindergarten as carefully as possible so that their educational experiences at Head Start are not lost. Our program works together with local public schools to promote school readiness and to engage families as their children make the transition to kindergarten. To ease the transition from UPK to Kindergarten our UPK children visited P.S. 16 and P.S. 84. Children had the opportunity to interact in some of the classrooms. The 3 year old children, who are transitioning into UPK, visited their new UPK classrooms, where the children had an opportunity to meet and interact with the new teacher.

<u>Puppetsburg Puppet Show</u>

The Puppetsburg Puppet Show preformed "Clementine and the Fiesta" for our children on June 14, 2018. The show was hands on and included dancing, instruments, dress-up and bubble time. Feedback for the children and teachers was very positive.




ABC Countdown to the Last Day of School
